President's Report

Our twenty-first AGM in March is the first based on the new reporting period established by Special Resolution in August 2011. Our Constitution requires an AGM to be held every twelve months, so this one will only cover the six month period to 31 December 2011. All future meetings will cover the twelve month period, 1 January to 31 December. Your Committee of Management has continued to work towards satisfactory outcomes of requirements set out in the Strategic Plan 2011 - 2013.

CAR PARK

Manningham Council established another Disabled Permit parking space, following our representation of the significant demand for existing spaces.

Also, following representation from MU3A and Pines Learning, a NO ENTRY sign was installed and directional arrows amended, to clearly indicate the exit gateway from our car park.

CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT

A wireless internet facility was purchased and setup, enabling tutors to utilise online connection in all the classrooms (Rooms 13 - 18). To support this technology, a wireless printer was purchased and is available for printing items from any of our computers that have wireless modems.

Fifteen new computers and monitors have been purchased jointly with Pines Learning and have been installed in Computer Lab 1. Each contains significant hard-drive capacity which should allow our tutors to teach the various computer classes without the difficulties previously encountered. There are two internet connections available for these machines to help minimise the slow speeds and dropouts that occurred last year.

Our website (<u>www.u3amanningham.org.au</u>) has been redesigned and updated and exhibits our organisation to the world through photographs, curriculum brochure and special reports about our activities.

CURRICULUM 2012

The Curriculum Committee has initially programmed 163 classes/activities and will establish some late starters from Term 2.The Summer School provided nine activities in which 250 members participated during January.

MEMBERSHIP

Around 1400 applications had been processed by 31 January with an average 3 classes per application. There are 73 classes with waiting lists due to greater demand than places available.

ACCESS AND EQUITY

The MU3A enrolment form has been amended to include a section for members to advise of any assistance required for vision, hearing or mobility. Class lists will show members who might need assistance and this information is to be used by tutors and class reps.

A wheelchair has been purchased for use by members when required; it is available from the office.

POLICY

Manningham U3A membership policy has been amended to better reflect our target base of retired and semiretired people. The Equal Opportunity Act allows organisations to distinguish membership criteria without discrimination.

In August 2011, the Victorian government amended the **Equal Opportunity Act 2010** to make applicable Sexual Harassment provisions to cover volunteer organisations and their members. U3A Network advised all its members to develop a policy and procedures and provided reference to a model document written by Volunteer Victoria.

Manningham U3A Sexual Harassment Policy and Procedures has been written, approved and published; a copy is held in the office for members. **Deirdre Meredith** has agreed to be our first **Equal Opportunity Officer** and she is available to assist any member with concerns.

PLANNING

A group has been established to examine, research, conduct forums and report to your Committee on issues relevant to membership, curriculum, accommodation and future matters relevant to Manningham U3A.

HEALTH and SAFETY

Following a number of reported incidents involving Council tables, your Committee has purchased 21 new tables that are lighter, stronger and easier to setup and store away. Members have commented favourably on these purchases.

Two mobile mirrors were purchased for use by various classes so that members could check their technique whilst in class and under the watchful eye of the tutor. A First Aid kit was purchased and is stored in the room at the rear of the office area. A defibrillator was jointly purchased by Pines Learning and MU3A for use in extreme emergencies. It is stored in the small interview room off the foyer at the rear of Pines Learning Reception.

During our 20th year, your CoM held a number of functions at which we recognised members for their outstanding contributions.



On Being a Volunteer

Our U3A's enrolments occur at about the time that Christmas is beginning to engulf us. So last November, when I was thinking of 2012 classes, I also was receiving in the post urgent appeals for Christmas donations to various charities - all glossy pamphlets, illustrated mainly by images of children. My benevolence is, alas, limited by limited finances and could not be extended to additional causes, however worthy of support. I did not enjoy setting aside for recycling those wide-eyed, wistful little faces (which included those of a couple of loveable puppies).

Because I was focusing on another happy year with U3A, I was also mentally admiring the competence of the volunteers who keep the organization running smoothly. As I opened another appeal, it occurred to me that these not-for-profit groups probably depend on volunteers too. This thought brought me to cogitate on volunteering in general.

U3A members performing voluntary tasks are probably not aware that they have global recognition. There is an *International Volunteer Day* on 5 December each year, established by the United Nations in 1985. "Volunteering", says the UN Declaration, "is a fundamental building block of civil society. It brings to life the noblest aspirations of humankind: the pursuit of peace, freedom, opportunity, safety and justice for all people". (Such a statement certainly adds lustre to office duty!)

Since 1985, there has been increasing attention paid to volunteering. There is *Volunteering Australia*, the body that makes submissions to government about the not-for-profit sector. *Volunteering Melbourne* engages in activities like holding workshops, conferences, organizing the International Day and listing the available voluntary positions. According to the national body, volunteering has been worth 45 billion dollars to the Australian economy. (Just call us volunteers Goldfingers.)

Professor Jeni Warburton of La Trobe University has written extensively about seniors who volunteer. She points out that volunteering "has an economic and a social value...volunteering improves health outcomes of older people with large scale studies showing that volunteers are better able to maintain function, have improved psychological health and even reduced mortality". Yet, despite all the benefits lauded for old and less old, organizations need many more volunteers. There are helpful hints on the Internet on how to recruit, train, motivate and retain volunteers, with some comments on the off-putting nature of increasing bureaucratic regulations (which occasionally do recall the adage that a camel is a horse designed by a committee).

But how different our U3A is. There are plenty of skilled, highly motivated volunteers, with many tending to stay for years. Obviously, one motivation is to do with priority acceptance into classes of our choice. But I believe there is more to it. For example, it took a minimum of arm-twisting before I volunteered to write this article - because, like my U3A colleagues, I enjoy finding information new to me and talking about it. Just listen to the buzz of excitement when classes begin after the long break, as we happily greet old and new friends. As members of a popular organization run entirely by hardworking volunteers, we have much to be happy and excited about.
