

President's Report

Welcome to 2018 at U3A Manningham



We currently have a membership of around 1700, of whom 137 are new members. On behalf of all our returning members, I would like to welcome them and extend our good wishes for an enriching and stimulating year ahead.

As in previous years, we have a very extensive and wide-ranging program of activities although we still encounter problems with popular classes filling beyond capacity. In some of these areas, our tutors are able to increase class sizes and run extra classes, for which we are extremely grateful, but unfortunately not in sufficient numbers to eradicate the problem.

However, it is worth remembering that probably the greatest benefit to be had from participation in organisations such as ours comes from the opportunities that they give us to be engaged in our community at a time of life when social isolation and loneliness can eat away at people's health and wellbeing. So if you are not able to get into the class of your choice, consider doing something completely new and different - surprise your family and friends! Be ready to take advantage of this marvellous opportunity to keep active alongside friendly people.

The membership fee is now \$70 and we recently introduced the opportunity for members to make donations to our considerable running costs if they were so minded. Without this, we would be facing the coming financial year with very limited means of solvency. In those areas of greatest expenditure: utilities, office costs, computer maintenance, cleaning, and especially rents for external venues, costs have increased enormously and very dramatically. I am sure you will be well aware of this from other areas of your household expenses. Consequently, we are very grateful for your forbearance here and especially grateful to those of our members who felt able to make an extra donation over and above the annual fee.

Enrolments

Your Committee of Management is aware of the problems that many members experienced enrolling online and is currently working on how to overcome this and improve the process for next year's enrolment period.

Warwick Wright and his enrolment team are probably the most hardworking arm of management and I would like to thank them all for their industry, commitment and conscientious attention to implementing what is still a new and evolving computerised membership management system. I would also like to thank the tireless, always cheerful, data entry volunteers in the back office, who have been under considerable pressure this year with enrolment issues: **Joan French, Trish Bevan, Kathy Withers, Pam Grehan and Frank Lau.**

Many of the enrolment difficulties experienced by members were resolved because our ever cooperative and adaptable tutors willingly increased their class sizes to accommodate those members who, unwittingly, found themselves excluded from the classes of their choice. Our sincere thanks to you all.

Summer School 2018

I am pleased to report that our annual Summer School was enjoyed by many members. We were able to offer more activities than in previous years with some new classes appearing along with new tutors. This is a really good opportunity for members who are toying with the idea of running a class to try it out over a short four week period. A big thank you to all our participating tutors and especially to **Arthur Rance** who, as in previous years, organised twice-weekly outings to a variety of Melbourne destinations.

Many thanks to those members who volunteered their time to keep the office open during this period. **Tess Gibbs** organised the roster and timetabling of duties. Thank you, Tess. Thanks also to **David Jensz** for managing the important business of ensuring that The Pines building opened and closed at the correct times.

Celebratory Events

Perhaps a distant memory now but I would like to thank everybody who contributed to the Artistic Showcase and Unifest at the end of last term. As always, both events were interesting, inspiring and a lot of fun.

As always, the quality of the exhibits at the Artistic Showcase was of a spectacularly high standard and the range and variety of craft and artistic items on display was very impressive.

Unifest with its colour, vivacity and spectacle continues to be an end of year delight. Many thanks to **Tony Ellul** who orchestrated the performances in his usual relaxed and debonair manner. Thanks also to **Graeme Martin** and his teams of furniture movers and caterers for transforming the Pines Function Room into an exhibition hall one week and a seated performance venue the next - complete with refreshments.

Enrolment Report

Grateful thanks to **Joan French**, the senior member of our Data Entry team, for all her hard work between the conclusion of last year and the commencement of 2018. As a result of Joan's hard work, many members who were on wait lists have now got into their classes as vacancies have become available. This happens every year when people, realising that they have over-committed themselves, withdraw from classes, thus making room for others.

Thanks also to several tutors who have allowed extra members to join their classes. However, it is unfortunate that this practice is not possible for some classes because of space, equipment or safety requirements. I am sure class members will be very grateful to those tutors who have been so accommodating.

Help us to keep in touch with you

Please ensure that your personal profile is correct, especially your email address. It is impossible for us to contact you when your email address on the MyU3A system is incorrect. This is usually caused by a misspelt email address or a member getting a new email address and forgetting to update his or her personal profile.

Emails are often rejected when the recipient's mailbox is full. There are a number of ways this can be prevented - the simplest one being to delete emails that are no longer needed. There are a number of other ways of preventing this. If you cannot work out how, contact your internet provider and ask for help - after all, you are paying for it!

To update your profile, log in with the **Member Login** button on the Courses page using your **Member ID** and **Password**. Click on the **Update Profile** button and make any changes. (Note that all fields with a red * alongside them must be completed.) When finished, click on the **Commit** button to confirm the changes you have made.

MyU3A changes that will help members:

1. Many of you will know that we have provided access to the Practise Database so that if you want to change something in your profile but are not sure what impact it will have on the system, you can try it out in the Practise Database. The downside is that it is possible that you may change your profile in the Practise Database thinking that you are working in the live database and then wonder why your profile has not been updated. To prevent this from occurring, you will now be reminded when you go into the Practise Database as a warning message will appear in large letters.
2. A small number of members had problems during the enrolment period because the new classes for 2018 on the Class Status screen appeared above the 2017 classes that they were currently attending. Even though the current classes had the year underneath the class number, not everyone noticed and they incorrectly thought they were already enrolled for the next year.

In future, it will be much easier to differentiate between the classes for the current year (highlighted with a brown background) and the classes for the next year (highlighted with a green background). This problem will arise only during the enrolment period when the classes for two years are showing.

Vale Marjorie Beecham 1927-2017

Tutor: Pottery - 2007 to 2017

Born in Ivanhoe, Marjorie came from a family of leathersmiths. She grew up in Melbourne's eastern suburbs and attended Methodist Ladies College in Kew, after which she undertook an occupational therapy technician's course at RMIT.

In 1947, Marjorie began working at Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital. Marjorie was one of the first civilians to work there. She loved working with the returned soldiers.

Marjorie, who thought she would be using her leatherworking skills, was horrified when told she would be in charge of the pottery studio! She had to learn everything from the ground up and became interested in using clay as a medium for the soldiers to express their feelings. She joined a pottery group in Warrandyte in 1957. Members would make trips out to the old Warrandyte quarry to dig clay for their pots.

In 1950, Marjorie married Henry (Pi) Beecham. They moved to Castle Hill in Warrandyte where she established a pottery studio and kiln in the garden of her home.



Marjorie was a life member of the Warrandyte Mechanics Institute and Arts Association, which recently celebrated its 50th Anniversary and she conducted pottery workshops in its pottery studio from 1965 until very recently.

Marjorie was also a member of Rotary and was generous with donations of her handmade pots to give to speakers each month. In 2016, she received the Paul Harris Award for her contributions to Rotary.

Marjorie joined U3A Manningham in 2007 and volunteered to be a pottery tutor. For many years, she taught a pottery hand-building course and arranged for her students' work to be exhibited at the annual U3AM Artistic Showcase.

At U3AM, Marjorie was an active participant in **Joan Sheridan's** Culture, Theory and Philosophy class. End-of-term afternoon teas at her home were happy, light-hearted occasions.

Marjorie was also a member of **Heather Ambrose's** Psychology Class from its inception. She was very open to learning and lived by the words "we do not stop playing because we are old, we grow old because we stop playing".

Marjorie was a happy person in herself. She projected a positive and dynamic attitude to life, immersing herself in her interests and projects. She loved her three daughters, Sally, Amanda and Creina, and adored her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She operated on the belief that if you started something you had to finish it! She did everything with grace, enthusiasm and generosity.

Her funeral was held at the Warrandyte Hall on 14 November 2017. The hall was full with many standing along the side walls.

Tutor Coordinator's Report

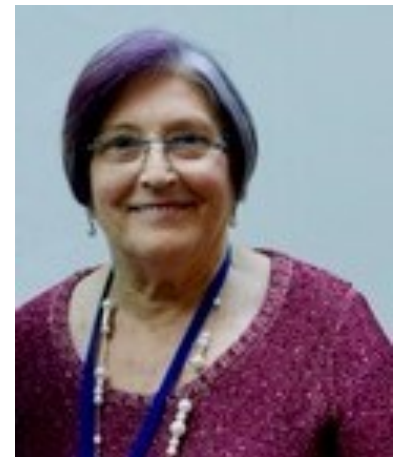
Hi everyone.

Vale David Lording

Tutor: History and Appreciation of Music - 1994 to 2012

Members of the U3AM community were saddened to hear of the passing of David on 10 December, just 12 days after he attended the Christmas class of the course he began in 1994.



It was not unusual for David to have more than 50 members in his class during the 19 years he ran it, exploring in great depth, often over 2-3 weeks, a multitude of composers. These included Brahms, Beethoven, Tchaikovsky, Bach, Haydn, Mozart, Debussy, Rachmaninoff, Chopin, and many others. His knowledge was backed up by intensive research, often over a period of months.

David stepped down from leading his class in 2012, six years after suffering a stroke. Since then, members have been continually amazed when he still contributed gems of information during sessions, adding colour and interesting memorabilia to the discussion.

David was the oldest of four boys who all attended Mont Albert Central School before going on to Melbourne Grammar. He always wanted to be a teacher and graduated from The University of Melbourne with a B.A. and Dip.Ed.

Before becoming a tutor at U3AM following his retirement in 1992, David contributed to the wider society in his work as a teacher of French, History, Maths and Geography, plus his role as Deputy Principal at Forest Hill Secondary College. He has also been an enthusiastic football player, as well as a cricket supporter and umpire.

David will be greatly missed as husband to Jenny, father to his children, Cathie, Ros and Stephen, and grandfather to his seven grandchildren.

290 people signed the Condolence Book at David's service, proof indeed that he touched so many lives and was revered and respected by many, both in and out of U3AM. We are grateful to David for enriching the lives of so many members of U3A Manningham.
